



The Passion of the Lord

We begin this journey of Holy Week with the first Gospel of Palm Sunday, remembering Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem with adoring crowds waving palms and shouting "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the kingdom of our Father David that is to come! Hosanna in the highest!" But this triumphant moment is brief as we move into Mark's telling of the Passion of the Lord in today's Gospel.



In the first 25 verses of Chapter 14, of Mark's Gospel, two ritual acts foreshadow the passion. First, the woman who anoints Jesus engages in an individual act of extravagant devotion. She is criticized by some but defended by Jesus. The woman's action is a unique act of honoring Jesus which he sees as anticipating his burial. Secondly, during the Passover Seder feast, Jesus takes an ancient ritual and makes it personal: "This is my body, this is my blood." Verses 22-24 are one of the few hints in Mark's Gospel that the death of Jesus has salvific properties.



Agony in the Garden

In the next 26 verses, Mark tells of the events leading up to Jesus' arrest. In these verses, he lays out starkly the failures of his disciples to stand with him, despite their protestations of loyalty. In Gethsemane, we see a very human Jesus. Jesus knows that events are headed for a violent end. He is described as "*distressed and agitated*" (verse 33), and he speaks of being "*deeply grieved*" (verse 34). Yet his prayer combines fervent supplication with reverent submission. The human Jesus does not want to die, while the obedient Son will not turn away from his task.

In the next section of the Gospel, Jesus is subjected to trials, both Roman and Jewish, neither of which follow the due process of that ancient time. At the same time, Peter is facing his own trial. He denies Jesus three times as predicted by Jesus. When we read this passage, it might do us well to remember our own failures and acts of betrayal.

Finally, Mark chronicles the Crucifixion, Death and Burial of Jesus. In Mark's Gospel telling of the Passion, only Joseph of Arimathea and the women (in particular, Mary Magdalene) appear as sympathetic characters.

The Passion is an extraordinary telling of handing one's life over to God. "Rather he emptied himself and took the form of a slave ... and it was thus that he humbled himself, obediently accepting death, even death on a cross." (Philippians). We too are called to this. This week, we practice dying and rising, handing over our lives and receiving the spirit of God that will rescue us. We stand and fall together into the arms of our God, alongside Jesus, handing over our spirits.

I pray that this year's Holy Week will be filled with blessings and gifts from the Holy Spirit that will lead us to the glory of Easter Sunday.

PASSION

The contrast between the processional Gospel reading in today's liturgy and the proclamation of the Passion is striking. We are given a glimpse of how profoundly the word of God is fulfilled in Jesus.

First, he must be hailed as the Messiah, the One who is to come. He must be acknowledged by all, though they do not know what they are saying. They think he is the promised king, a worldly king of the Jews who will free them from the Roman occupation. They do not yet understand, even the disciples, exactly where this triumphal procession is leading. In our lives, we too do not know where we are going. It is in faith that we can follow Christ wherever he may lead us, trusting that death is not the end, nor evil the victor.

WHAT IS THE MEANING OF PALM SUNDAY?

Traditionally known as Passover (Pascha), the meaning of Palm Sunday as understood from our Christian history is interesting. Palm Sunday began in the church of Jerusalem, in the late fourth century. The ceremony included prayers, hymns, and sermons recited by clergy as the people walked through the various holy sites within the city. When they arrived at the last site, where Christ was thought to have ascended into heaven, the clergy read from the gospel telling the story of Jesus' entry to Jerusalem. At early evening they would return to the city, reciting: "Blessed is He that comes in the name of the Lord." The children were assigned to carry palm and olive branches as the people walked back through the city and returned to the church, where the evening services would conclude.

As we know it, Palm Sunday is a commemoration of the triumphal entry of Jesus onto Jerusalem to celebrate Passover. The gospels teaches us that his arrival into the city was riding on a donkey, while the crowds of people spread their cloaks and palm branches on the street and shouted "Hosanna to the Son of David" and "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord." They did this to recognize His coming as the long-awaited Messiah and King.

What is the significance of Jesus riding a donkey and having his way paved with palm branches? According to the prophet Zechariah (9:9) this is a fulfillment of a prophecy. In biblical times, it was customary for any king or nobility to arrive in a procession riding on the back of a donkey. The donkey was considered a symbol of peace; those who rode upon a donkey were considered as arriving with peaceful intentions. The laying of palms indicated that the king or dignitary arriving was coming in victory or triumph.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION


For many centuries, Christian pilgrims have longed to walk in the footsteps of Jesus, and on Passion Sunday the eyes of the world are on the *Via Dolorosa*, the "Road of Sorrows," in Jerusalem. As soon as it became safe for Christians to worship in public in the fourth century, a way was marked out. It was changed a few times over the years, and today's usual route was sketched by the Franciscans six hundred years ago, although Anglicans and Byzantines have their own unique detours. Friday is the most favored day, although it is crowded then. Almost everyone begins at the Lion's Gate in the Muslim Quarter, and ends at the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. It's less than a quarter mile, but it threads its way through crowded markets with souvenir shops and fast-food snacks. There are, just as in your parish church, fourteen stations along the way. The exact spots are not known, but what matters is the pilgrim's unique ability to see even an ordinary road in a teeming city as something more than meets the eye.


