



Father's Day and St. Joseph

Father's Day, like Mother's Day, is well celebrated in the United States. On Mother's Day, many celebrate the day by taking mom out to brunch or dinner. Father's Day is often celebrated in the backyard taking the opportunity to enjoy the beginning of summer. This is a time to recognize the important place of dad. A father plays a singularly important role in the life of a family. Children need a father. Fathers have a God-given responsibility to their children.



In recognition of this, in 1989, Saint Pope John Paul II issued an apostolic exhortation on St. Joseph and the Catholic understanding of fatherhood – *Redemptoris Custos* (Guardian of the Redeemer: On the Person and Mission of St. Joseph in the Life of Christ and the Church.)

Roles between mothers and fathers have changed significantly in United States families. Some fathers stay home with the children, while mothers go off to work. In the majority of households, both parents work to support the family and share the responsibilities of parenting and care of the home. How families divide household and child care duties is not important. What is important is that both parents are engaged with their children.

Just how important are fathers? A father is a source of strength and support. A dad puts the needs of his family before his own. A dad teaches his children the value of hard work, courage, honesty and good judgment. A dad creates memories with his children that will last them a lifetime...by teaching them to ride a bicycle, how to throw a curveball, tinker with a car engine or simply just by quiet-time together, allowing his children to revel in the security of a protective, paternal love. A dad encourages his children to live lives of holiness and quiet fortitude. Most of all, through his own life of faith, a father teaches his children by example to cultivate a personal relationship with God through prayer, to live their lives according to God's word and guide them firmly along the path to eternal life. Whether he realizes it or not, it is through such dedication and commitment to his family, that a dad emulates Saint Joseph. What greater lessons could a man's life teach? So, yes, fathers are very important!



Fatherhood is a vocation and we are called to be actively engaged in this calling from God, in a way that quietly but effectively spreads the faith and extends God's kingdom in everyplace and age. We can rejoice that St. Joseph through his marriage to Mary was caught up in the mystery of spiritual fatherhood and became a model of marriage, care of one's child, and a model to every believer and particularly for men in their role as father.

Today, as we honor and thank our dads for all they have done for us and for how much they mean to us, let us remember to ask Saint Joseph for his intercession on behalf of all dads, living and dead, and that his holy example continues to be an inspiration to all fathers.

THE MASTER STORY TELLER

In today’s Gospel, Jesus is presented to us as the master storyteller. He loved to use parables as a tool for comparing one thing to something else. In most of his parables, Jesus revealed who God is by comparing God’s essence or actions with something familiar to his listeners.

In the parable of the mustard seed, Jesus proclaims a marvelous and irrefutable truth. His small band of disciples, as insignificant as they may have felt, would one day produce a mighty kingdom whose growth was initiated by God. The seeds of this kingdom were planted by God and it is God who will harvest the fruit brought forth from those seeds. The extent of the growth of God’s kingdom cannot be predicted. We must trust the work of the Master’s hand as we, the mustard plant, grow and grow.

“Here this! A sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seed fell on the path, and the birds came and ate it up. Other seed fell on rocky ground where it had little soil. It sprang up at once because the soil was not deep. And when the sun rose, it was scorched and it withered for lack of roots. Some seed fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked it and it produced no grain. And some seed fell on rich soil and produced fruit. It came up and grew and yielded thirty, sixty, and a hundredfold.”

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TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The reign of God comes about because people commit to reversing their lives completely, to embracing new vision, new values. Many popular television shows exploit an unattractive side of human nature by pitting contestants against one another, even to the point of performing dangerous stunts or devious schemes, to gain money or favor.

At the liturgy, we counter that impulse by committing ourselves to live generously. In response to Christ’s total gift, we offer bread and wine as the emblems of our lives, our hopes, our joys and sorrows. The bread and wine carried to the altar contain our lives, and by offering our lives to God, we prepare to receive the gift of God’s own life. We are to become what we receive: the body of Christ.

On Sundays, this self giving is often accompanied by a collection and procession of gifts for the poor and money for the upkeep of the parish. There are certainly other methods of collecting money, some perhaps more efficient. Yet the acts of giving from our abundance and attending to the needs of the poor open us up to participation in the changes the Reign of God requires.

MISSION CO-OP

Rev. Fr. Jino Mwaka will speak this weekend on behalf of the Propagation of Faith Mission Sunday Archdiocesan Appeal. Fr. Mwaka is a priest of the Archdiocese of Gulu in northern Uganda which has a Catholic population of more than 900,000 out of a total population of about 1.6 million people.

The Archdiocese of Gulu serves a people who have been through and come out of more than 2 decades of civil conflict and war that brought about serious physical, psychological, socio-economic as well as spiritual injuries and scars.

About ten years after the war, the Archdiocese of Gulu continues to deal with the aftermath of the war, while at the same time having to deal with an influx of refugees from South Sudan. The effects of the war on the local population is manifested in trauma and its effects such as addiction to alcohol and drugs, high rates of suicides and suicidal tendencies, rampant cases of violence (domestic and gender based violence, conflicts over land and property conflicts), physical and mental health challenges. These have affected the people’s capacity to cope with the daily challenges and stresses of life, to work productively and fruitfully to create wealth, to create meaningful relationships and to contribute to the community, to realize their potential and to adequately bear witness to life in its wholeness.



As part of its pastoral strategy and response to address the present and long term needs for healing, reconciliation, moral integrity, rebuilding, growth and development of the human community, the Archdiocese of Gulu has, initiated programs that, among others, engage and train different groups of people in the society to meaningfully contribute to the healing, reconciliation and rebuilding of the people. At the same time, the Archdiocese is focusing on the formation of the people, especially the laity, in solid intellectual reflection rooted in Catholic principles.

Fr. Jino heads the University of the Sacred Heart Gulu for the formation of catechists, laity, and the population in general in contributing to personal and social healing, growth and development. Ensuring the integral formation of the people is vital for the future of the Church in Uganda as well as for the future of our society. The support for this cause is most worthwhile.

PRIESTS ORDAINED AT THE CATHEDRAL



Archbishop José H. Gomez ordained nine new priests on June 5th, for the Archdiocese of Los Angeles at the Cathedral of Our Lady of the Angels in downtown Los Angeles.

"Our new priests are called from many different cultures and backgrounds and they are filled with the joy of the Gospel," said Archbishop Gomez. "I am honored to call them my friends and my co-workers in this great ministry of salvation.... And, as you know, you are called to be holy, but you are not 'perfect.' You are as human as the people you serve—and you always will be. Never forget that. It will keep you humble. And humility is the key to being a disciple and the key to being a good priest."

The men who entered the priesthood on June 5th are: Fr. Egran Gomez 42, Fr. Danilo Guinto 57, Fr. Gilbert Guzman 51, Fr. Ian-Vincent Hagan 51, Fr. Spencer Lewerenz 44, Fr. John O'Brien 51, Fr. Thomas Roide II 31, Fr. Pedro Saucedo Jr., and Fr. Matt Wheeler 30. All have completed theological formation at St. John's Seminary in Camarillo. They will begin their first parish assignments on July 1.

"It is a great joy and blessing for the Archdiocese to have these nine new priests ordained for priestly ministry in the local Church," said Father Samuel Ward, associate director of the Archdiocese's Office of Vocations. "Together they bring a wide breadth of professional work experience and pastoral ministry skills, including a former Catholic School Vice Principal, a Hollywood script developer, a magazine graphic designer, a lay missionary to high school youth, a computer programmer, a human resources representative, and a USC accounting major graduate.

The ordination Mass is a sacramental ceremony in which a man becomes a priest and is enabled to minister Christ's name and that of the Church. The essential rite of the Sacrament takes place during the Laying on of Hands and Prayer of Consecration, an ancient tradition in the Church, mentioned in the Bible.

Upon conclusion of Mass, the new priests gave their first public blessings on the Cathedral Plaza surrounded by family, friends, members of their parish communities, their pastors and other priest mentors.

SAINTS THOMAS MORE AND JOHN FISHER

On Friday, June 22nd we celebrate two great English saints and martyrs. Both John Fisher and Thomas More were men of exemplary life, one a bishop, one a lawyer and family man who lived such upright lives that they were content to be martyred for the faith. Fr. Bill Curran, history master at Radcliffe college, said "They were martyrs because they were saints, not saints because they were martyrs."¹

"Saints Thomas More and John Fisher were Renaissance men. Talented and energetic, they contributed to the humanist scholarship of early modern England. More wrote theological and philosophical treatises, while making a career as a lawyer and government official. Bishop John Fisher worked as an administrator at Cambridge, confronted the challenge Martin Luther presented to Christian Europe, and most importantly served as Bishop of Rochester. As a bishop, he is noted for his dedication to preaching at a time when bishops tended to focus on politics. These men were brilliant. They both corresponded with Erasmus, who helped Bishop Fisher learn Greek and Hebrew, and who also famously referred to More as a man *omnium horarium*, a man of all seasons."²

"Above all their accomplishments these men bore witness to a deep faith in Christ and his Church. More considered joining religious life and was assiduous in his devotional practices. As a married man, he committed himself wholly to his vocation as a father. At the time, disciplinary practices with children tended to be severe, but More's children testify to his warmth, patience, and generosity."³

"St. John Fisher was a model shepherd and demonstrated remarkable humility. He remained in the small Diocese of Rochester his entire episcopal ministry, devoting himself to his local church rather than seeking promotion to a larger, more powerful diocese."⁴

"Fisher and More were martyrs for the rights of conscience. Both men believed, as does the Church, that there are certain rights that the State can never arrogate for itself, and that includes those matters which are matters of conscience. But to see Fisher and More going to their deaths for freedom of religion, and for the rights of the individual against those of the over-mighty state, victims of Tudor totalitarianism, is only part of the story."⁵

"Both died for the integrity of the Catholic Church. Both firmly held that what Henry VIII wanted to do was not simply wrong, but impossible. A king could not be head of the church."⁶ King Henry VIII claimed to be the supreme head of the Church in England. Neither Fisher nor More could abide this claim, and their steadfastness to their consciences put them in conflict with the king. They were convicted of treason."⁷

"When More made his way to the gallows, he is said to have stated, 'I die the King's good servant, but God's first.' Both More and Fisher were patriots. They never rose up to incite rebellion or foment revolution. They were no traitors, but when the law of the king came into conflict with the law of Christ, they chose Christ. These men gave their lives for the freedom of the Church and for freedom of conscience. They bear witness to the truth that no government can make a claim on a person's soul."⁸
