

St. Dominic August 8th Feast Day

In some of these articles, I have talked about various Saints. St. Francis of Assisi, St. Louise de Marillac, St. John Neuman, St. Bonaventure, and now I wish to comment on St. Dominic. His Feast Day is this Wednesday, August 8th. St. Francis of Assisi, St. Bonaventure and St. Dominic were contemporaries in the 12th century. They founded Religious Institutions during a chaotic period of history in our Church. The beginning of the second millennium after the death of Christ is often referred to as the Middle Ages. Most of Europe was firmly Christian. The Holy Roman Empire was the largest and most powerful Nation State. Christianity was reaching into Northern Europe in Norway and Sweden. The Church had passed through the Great Schism which divided the Eastern and Western Church. This is when and where these great Saints found themselves.

St. Dominic was born in 1170 in Old Castile, Spain. He was trained for the priesthood by a priest-uncle, studied the arts and theology, and became a canon of the cathedral at Osma, where there was an attempt to revive the apostolic common life described in the Acts of the Apostles.



On a journey through France with his bishop, Dominic came face to face with the then virulent Albigensian heresy. The Albigensians—or Cathari, “the pure ones”—held to the principle that all matter is evil—hence they denied the Incarnation and the sacraments. On the same principle, they abstained from procreation and took a minimum of food and drink. Dominic sensed the need for the Church to combat this heresy and was commissioned to be part of the preaching crusade against it. He saw immediately why the preaching crusade was failing: the ordinary people admired the ascetic life of the Albigenses. Understandably, they were not impressed by the Catholic preachers who traveled with horse and retinues, stayed at the best inns and had servants. Dominic therefore, with three Cistercian priests, began itinerant preaching according to the gospel ideal. St. Dominic’s humility, faith, kindness, patience and

joyfulness impressed even his enemies. During his lifetime, he healed the sick. When threatened with death, he would reply: “I am not worthy of the martyr’s crown.” He twice rejected a bishopric, and he enjoyed a warm friendship with St. Francis of Assisi, which is still commemorated in the liturgies of the Franciscan and Dominican Orders.

Dominic founded a three-fold religious Order, one for the converted Albigensian women (later the Dominican sisters), one for an apostolic band of friar preachers, and another for men and women known as tertiaries living in the world as lay Dominicans affiliated with the Order.

On August 15, 1217, he scattered his men to various parts of Europe saying: “If grain is sown it bears fruit, but if it is stored it rots.” He died of exhaustion after his last mission in Lombardy at the age of 51. After making a general confession, he said to his weeping brethren: “Do not weep, my children, I shall be more useful to you where I am going than I have ever been in this life. Have charity, guard humility, keep voluntary poverty.” He died August 6, 1221, at Bologna, Italy, where his relics now lie in a marble tomb.

The lives of the Saints give us models to imitate. St. Dominic lived a life of both active ministry as a preacher and as a contemplative in his prayer life. We too are called to be active in our Church and to live lives of prayer. I know it is hard to find balance between our jobs, our families, our Church ministries and prayer, but we must always strive for that balance. We must trust that the Spirit will always be there to give us the strength to try.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

In 1794, a young Irishwoman befriended two widows aboard ship while emigrating to America. They bought a house in Philadelphia and began to live a community life under the direction of a priest. Soon they relocated to Washington. There, the "pious ladies," as the neighbors called them, were asked by their priest friend, by then the president of Georgetown University, to begin a religious community. In 1799 they established a branch of the Visitation Order founded by Saint Jane de Chantal and Saint Francis de Sales in the 1620s.

The unique vision of this order followed a sensible routine, less arduous and more flexible than most traditions, and also accepted widows and older women. Amazingly, this American outpost of the Visitation began without reference to the "rule" of the Order. Most of the European convents had been lost under the "reign of terror," and the rules and customs of the community could not be obtained. A copy of the rule was discovered in 1812, and in 1816 the pope officially established the monastery. By then, some French nuns had regrouped, and they sent a habit and cross to be copied. (No religious wore the habit in public in the United States until after the Civil War.) From the beginning, the Georgetown nuns had an educational mission, even though they discovered in the "rule" that such work was officially off-limits for the contemplative life. In America, the nuns depended on a school for their livelihood, so the rule was adapted. Today, the Academy of the Visitation is a thriving example of excellence in Catholic education, and the adjacent monastery is the oldest monastic foundation in the original thirteen United States .

WHAT IS THE TRANSFIGURATION?

All three synoptic gospels tell the story of the Transfiguration of Jesus (Matthew 17:1-13; Mark 9:3-13; Luke 9:28-36) - frequently a sign of the importance of an event from Jesus' life for the early Christian community. Its origin is debated. Some scholars say the Transfiguration episode is really an account of Jesus' resurrection which was moved to a different part of the gospels. Others think it has its roots in an actual visionary event of some kind.

Wherever it came from, the Transfiguration is a highly symbolic story. Jesus took his inner circle of apostles—Peter, James, and John—up a mountain, which in the Bible is a place of revelation, so it was clear something important was about to happen.



These three apostles then saw Jesus as part of another important trio, completed with Moses and Elijah, symbols of Israelite tradition.

As if that weren't spectacular enough, the voice of God itself made an appearance, uttering two thundering phrases: "this is my Son" and "Listen to him."

Unfortunately, none of the apostles' reactions showed that they understood what had just happened. First of all, they were half-asleep when the whole thing started—not the last time that would happen at a key moment. They were also terrified to the point of talking nonsense about building shelters for the holy figures. Then on the way down they started an off-topic debate about the resurrection and Elijah.

What the apostles didn't grasp right away was the significance of the fact that Moses and Elijah were "talking with" Jesus. This sacred conversation identified Jesus with the law and the prophets. It showed how Jesus had the same authority as these two pillars of Israel's tradition and how that authority came from the same God. To leave no doubt, God's voice drove home the point with words heard at an earlier affirmation of Jesus' status, his baptism: "This is my son, the beloved" (Matthew 3:17).

The Gospel of Luke adds a delicious detail: Moses and Elijah had been speaking with Jesus "of his exodus that he was going to accomplish in Jerusalem." His exodus? That load points back to the sometimes arduous journey following Jesus, and that's what the Transfiguration is about. It's wonderful to find inspiration in a shining vision of Jesus, but the message to the church then and now is that witnessing glory is one thing, following is another. After the vision is over, you look up and see, as the apostles did, "Jesus only," and you realize that, to get to the further glory of eternal life, you have to follow him to the CROSS." 

SAFETY & SECURITY 101: INCREASE YOUR AWARENESS


