



ST. FRANCIS OF ASSISI FEAST DAY – OCTOBER 4th

Francis was born in Assisi, Italy to Pietro di Bernardone, a wealthy cloth merchant in 1181. As a youngster, he was bright, popular and athletic, though he occasionally showed signs of his later love for charity and disdain for the world.

Various stories suggest St. Francis began to display seemingly erratic behavior – such as giving away his father’s wealth, giving away his own clothes, going to various churches and looking after outcasts such as lepers. It was during this period, that St. Francis had a mystical vision in a dilapidated church. The Icon of Christ Crucified said to him, “Francis, Francis, go and repair My house which, as you can see, is falling into ruins.”

This vision gave Francis a clear mission in life and he embraced a life of poverty, chastity and devotion to Jesus Christ. He spent much of his time in prayer and meditation. Gradually, he began to attract other young men, attracted by his spiritual fervor and renunciation. Initially, Francis and his band of men were outside the traditional church hierarchy which caused some consternation among local bishops and powerful people. Because of the ongoing difficulties, Francis resolved to make a pilgrimage to the Vatican in Rome to try and gain an audience with the Pope.

Much to everyone’s surprise, Francis succeeded in not only meeting the Pope but, also gaining approval for a new order based on the principles of poverty and the spirit of the Gospels. It is said the Pope at first refused, but later had a dream where he was given to see the spiritual nature of St Francis. With this papal approval, St. Francis was able to grow his mission and his fellow friars travelled around Italy and Europe founding spiritual communities based on the teachings of St. Francis.

St. Francis also was a close spiritual confidant of St. Clare of Assisi who also gave up much wealth and privilege to embrace a life of poverty. Many miracles have been associated with St Francis. In particular, people recorded that St. Francis seemed to have a close connection with all animals, especially birds. When St Francis would give a sermon, it is said birds would come to listen. St. Francis said of birds:

“My sister birds, you owe much to God, and you must always and in everyplace give praise to Him; for He has given you freedom to wing through the sky and He has clothed you... you neither sow nor reap, and God feeds you and gives you rivers and fountains for your thirst, and mountains and valleys for shelter, and tall trees for your nests.”

St. Francis was noted for his love of all of God’s creation, he often referred to “Brother Sun” and “Sister Moon,”. He saw in everything a part of God’s creation. One story about St. Francis relates to how he was able to tame a wild wolf – in exchange for making a deal where the villagers would promise to feed the hungry wolf.

Around 1220, St. Francis set up one of the first known nativity scenes at Greccio near Assisi. St. Francis used live animals around the manger of Jesus; St. Francis hoped that people would gain a much more vivid impression of the humble nature of Jesus’ birth. The nativity scene became an important aspect of the Christian religion at Christmas time. Later in his life, it is also recorded that St. Francis received the stigmata ‘five wounds of Christ on the cross’.

After a period of illness and suffering, St. Francis died on the evening of October 3, 1226, singing Psalm 142– “*Voce mea ad Dominum.*”

NOT AGAINST US

Like Moses before him, Jesus corrects his disciples’ misunderstanding of the gift of the Spirit. They saw people who were not of their company casting out demons and doing other works such as Jesus had done. Jesus points out that no one who does a good deed in his name can be opposed to him at the same time. He goes on to point out the importance of the “little ones,”: the poor, simple people, children, the meek ones who are not important in the world. It is to them that he was sent, not to the wealthy and the self-righteous. He underscores the importance of small works done in faith, as well as big works like driving out demons. “Anyone who gives you a cup of water . . . because you belong to Christ . . . will surely not lose his reward” (Mark 9:41). God builds the coming reign little by little in our actions, however small and unassuming, when they are done out of love of God and neighbor.

FIRST FRIDAY DEVOTIONS



We encourage our entire parish community to visit with Jesus for a few minutes during First Friday Eucharistic Adoration this **Friday, October 5th** in the church between 6:20 am to 7:00 pm. Join us at 7:00 pm for Mass with the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick.

We are always blessed when we spend time with the Lord in Eucharistic Adoration. It is a time for each of us to fix our eyes on Him and listen to His voice as we adore Him. As we spend time with Him, the Holy Spirit can use this time to show us how we can overcome sin and temptation and to reach out to those in need.

The Blessed Sacrament will be exposed after the 8:00 am Mass until just prior to evening Mass at 7:00 pm. When visiting please keep in your intentions a prayer for vocations to religious life. At 12:00 noon the Angelus is recited and at 3:00 pm the Divine Mercy is prayed, at 4:00 pm to 5:00 pm the Guadalupana’s pray and sing in Spanish. At 5:15 pm to 6:00 pm, we have Children’s Eucharistic Adoration, and from 6:00 pm to 7:00 pm is our Lord of Light which includes a Rosary, Divine Mercy and Chaplet of Angels.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

From its earliest days, the Church has had an interest in the education of young people. In ancient Rome, teachers of boys had to resign their posts in order to become catechumens, since the education of boys was so keyed to the lore and worship of the gods. In other ages, public education has been so attuned to other values that creative solutions have arisen.

In late eighteenth- and early nineteenth-century Ireland, government schools had a goal of “Anglicizing” the Irish in culture and religion. Most Irish Catholics opted out in favor of “hedge schools.” In these largely secret schools, meeting not just in the shadow of hedges but also in cottages and barns throughout Ireland, schoolmasters provided eager students with a classical education grounded in Greek and Latin, Irish literature, the banned Gaelic language, and the catechism of the Church.

The so-called penal laws forbade Catholics from teaching young people publicly or privately, and “civil disobedience” ruled the day. In 1826, a British government study showed that of half a million Irish children enrolled in schools, 403,000 were in hedge schools! A woman named Nano Nagle defied the law by opening schools for the poor. Eventually her companions became the Presentation Sisters. A layman named Edmund Rice, inspired by her courage, founded the Irish Christian Brothers for the same purpose. By 1820, the situation eased, since Irish Catholics had shown that they would defy any law that diminished their love of learning and threatened their faith.

WHAT IS THIS?

Have you ever wondered what something was called, or if there is a proper name for something you’ve seen in the church?

Parts of the Church

- Altar—The table on which the Mass is celebrated. Sometimes it looks like a table and sometimes it looks like a sacrificial block.
- Altar Cloth —The cloth which covers the altar used to protect the altar surface and as a sign of respect for the holiness of the altar.
- Corporal—A white square cloth used to catch crumbs at the altar.
- Ambo (pulpit)—The stand or reading table from which the readings and homily are proclaimed.
- Lectionary—The book of readings from the Bible.
- Presidential or Presider’s Chair—The chair on which the celebrant sits.

THIS WEEK'S HIGHLIGHTS

First Saturday

The Five First Saturdays in honor of the Immaculate Heart of Mary is a devotion which the Blessed Virgin Mary requested of Sister Lucia of Fatima to make reparation for the offenses against the Immaculate Heart of Mary. For those who fulfill the required parts of the devotion the Blessed Virgin Mary promised to "assist at the hour of death with the graces necessary for salvation all those who, in order to make reparation to me, on the First Saturday of five successive months, go to confession, receive Holy Communion, say five decades of the Rosary, and keep me company for a quarter of an hour, meditating on the fifteen mysteries of the Rosary."

For this devotion to be accomplished the individual must do the required steps on five consecutive first Saturdays, which means the first Saturday of any five consecutive months.

1. The first point is regards confession which may be done 7 days before or after the first

Saturday. As one must receive communion in a state of grace on the first Saturday, one would need to go to confession before receiving Holy Communion if in a state of mortal sin to fulfill this devotion.

2. The second point is to receive Holy Communion for five consecutive first Saturdays with the intention of making reparation for the offenses against the Immaculate Heart of Mary. One must be in a state of grace to receive Holy Communion so it is proper if necessary, to go to confession before the day in order to fulfill this requirement.
3. The Third point is to pray the Rosary while meditating on the particular mysteries of the life of Jesus and Mary contained within the Rosary. On Saturday we generally pray the Joyful Mysteries of the Rosary. Again this act is offered for the intention of making reparation to the

offenses against the Immaculate Heart of Mary.

4. Finally, Our Lady requested that we spend 15 minutes keeping her company while meditating on one or more of the mysteries of the Rosary. This meditation can come from the Joyful, Sorrowful, Glorious or Luminous Mysteries of the Rosary and made with the intention of making reparation for the offences against the Immaculate Heart of Mary.

To those who faithfully follow Our Lady's requests for the Five First Saturdays, she has made a magnificent promise which she, our heavenly Mother, will certainly fulfill: "I promise to assist at the hour of death with the graces necessary for salvation." This means that our Blessed Mother will be present with us at the hour of death with the actual graces necessary for salvation. This beautiful promise of course requires that we cooperate with the graces given to assist us in our sanctification and union with the will of God as we prepare to depart from this life to eternal life.


