

Bored at Mass? A 7-Step Method to Make More of the Eucharist

One of the most common refrains I hear from young people is “Mass is boring. Homilies are boring. I don’t know why I have to come to Sunday after Sunday.” Some of the youth in the rear pews would be distracted on their phones during Mass. When I asked them once what they were doing, one of them retorted with a straight face that he was Instagramming pictures of Mass and tweeting quotes from my homily! Cheeky little fellow (lol), but he got me there.

I googled what advice other writers had to give for this problem. But I was met with advice that bordered more on the spiritual. Well, that’s beautiful and brings out the spiritual and salvific meaning of the Eucharist. Most young people I know sincerely want to participate in the Mass more meaningfully, they understand that the Eucharist is rich and meaningful but yet find it difficult to focus and concentrate. Hence, I am tempted to mention some practiced steps that one could undertake to get more absorbed into the Mass. So what do I do?

7 practical steps to make the Mass more meaningful for you.

1. Get me to the Church on time.

Getting to the church at least 10 minutes before Mass makes a huge difference. It gives your mind some time to dial down from the fast-paced activities that you came from. Having all your general preoccupations at the back of your head quite often distracts heavily, and since the readings (Liturgy of the Word) happen close to the beginning, you are bound to lose out and pay less attention. Use the time before Mass to kneel and speak to God from your heart. Offer to Him all your joys and the challenges that you are facing, and you will find God speaking to you during the Eucharist.

2. Mother Church wants YOU.

I’ve had young adults telling me that they feel more involved in the Eucharist when they play some role at Mass. There are a number of options available—choir, lectors, ushers, greeters, altar servers or church decoration. Becoming a member of one of these groups will focus your attention on what’s happening and make you more attentive. Being a member of one of these groups has many other positive side effects as well for your personal life.

3. Pray Business Class.

Avoid looking for a place in the last pews of the Church right at the back, especially when there is plenty of space up front. They say that the front pews receive more grace! Sitting up front will help you avoid distractions. Why is it that everyone wants front row seats at a musical concert or at a game, but the last seats in Church? More importantly, excuse yourself from your friends and peers and sit separately for the duration of Mass, especially if your friends tend to be a distraction. You can always rejoin them later. Your friends may tease you initially, but they will respect you eventually. Pray for your friends!

4. Come on out, you Bathroom Singers.

Take the hymn book and sing along. Can you imagine how bored you would be if you went to a concert and didn’t know any of the songs? Exactly! Taking part in the proceedings, even if you don’t get much out of it initially, goes a long way. Don’t expect quick results.

5. A Tweeting Exercise

“Homilies are so boring!” How often I have heard that. Turns out, most times they are not; in fact they are usually pretty interesting and the priest has probably put in a lot of effort preparing it. Give yourself an exercise. Listen to the homily and try to capture the essence of it in 140 characters or less. Then, after Mass, tweet it. It’s harder than you think.

6. It’s a 167-to-1

Remember the Mass is Thanksgiving and if you are a Sunday Church-goer, then you are giving God your full attention for 1 hour. The rest of the 167 hours each week, God gives you as a gift and doesn’t step in your way. Ask yourself how many good things you have received from the Lord. Isn’t it right and just that we spend one hour each week worshipping our Creator with all our hearts?

7. A Perfect - Mary

The final word belongs to Mary, Queen of heaven and earth and our Mother. Ask Mary to intercede for you during Mass. Pray to her for guidance and strength. She was always by Our Lord’s side and she will remain by yours as well. No human being understands you better than Mary does.

Follow these 7 steps and you will slowly find the beauty of the Eucharist opening up before you. As with any other activity, this too will take time. Don’t expect to be charged up on the first Sunday itself. All great tastes develop in time and with patience. You cannot make great music on the first day. Neither was Rome built in a day.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

When the Roman Empire turned a favorable eye toward the once-persecuted Christians, among the effects was a population explosion at the baptismal font, as Christian sympathizers stepped from the shadows. With more and more people becoming Christians, laws were passed to protect Sunday as a work-free day.

Soon, it became possible to celebrate mass later in the morning, rather than the older custom of gathering before dawn to celebrate Eucharist. Amazingly, despite the increasing numbers of Christians, there was great resistance to adding to the number of worship events; the Eucharist that began as a few friends around a table soon was transformed into a more formal event with throngs crowding a large hall. All the Christians in a city or town would gather around the bishop for the one Sunday Eucharist, and only when the crowds became unmanageable was there an impulse to divide the assembly by splitting off a new bishop and flock.

Now, sixteen hundred years later, many parishes see a need to trim or combine Mass schedules. This is often seen as tough surgery. Yet our forebearers in the faith would see it as a gain: a filling up of the Eucharist with a large and vigorous assembly, a fullness of ministry, an opportunity to make the Church more fully visible and stronger for service. —James Field, Copyright © J. DO NO HARM

We listen quite a while before we get to the “punch line” of the first reading today: even though it would be an easy thing to do, David will not harm the anointed one of the Lord. We, of course, know that Jesus is the Messiah, the anointed one of God, but the Bible uses this term for many different people. It is scripture’s way of indicating who has been chosen by God for a special place and mission in salvation history.

In today’s Gospel, Jesus presents a greatly enlarged list of those who, as children of God, we should not harm, but love instead: our enemies, those who curse us or do us harm, those who owe us money, the ungrateful, the wicked. The point of Jesus’ teaching is not to encourage these kinds of behaviors in others, but rather to form us in the image of our heavenly Father by increasing our opportunities to love unconditionally, expecting no return; to be merciful and forgiving, even when it would be easier not to.

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HOLY WATER




SUMMER BIBLE CAMP

First Friday and First Saturday Devotions

The First Friday of each month was desired by Jesus Christ to be consecrated to the devotion and adoration of His most Sacred Heart. Jesus revealed this desire to the Blessed Margaret Mary. On the day itself we should offer and consecrate ourselves, with all our thoughts, words, and actions, to Jesus, that His Sacred Heart may be thereby honored and glorified.

In the excess of the mercy of my Heart, I promise you that my all powerful love will grant to all those who will receive Communion on the First Fridays, for nine consecutive months, the grace of final repentance: they will not die in my displeasure, nor without receiving the sacraments; and my Heart will be their secure refuge in that last hour.

The First Friday devotion and the First Saturday devotion are both reparatory devotions. The First Friday devotion is associated with the Sacred Heart of Jesus, while the First Saturday devotion is associated with the Immaculate Heart of Mary. Both devotions are similar in that they call on the faithful to “stand in the gap” by doing penance for sinners, and both give a special promise of Divine assistance at the hour of death, that is, the promise of dying in a state of grace and therefore obtaining heaven.

First Friday Devotions



We encourage our entire parish community to visit with Jesus for a few minutes during First Friday Eucharistic Adoration this **Friday, March 1st** in the church between 4:00 pm to 7:00 pm. Join us at 7:00 pm for Mass with the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick.

We are always blessed when we spend time with the Lord in Eucharistic Adoration. It is a time for each of us to fix our eyes on Him and listen to His voice as we adore Him. As we spend time with Him, the Holy Spirit can use this time to show us how we can overcome sin and temptation and to reach out to those in need.

The Blessed Sacrament will be exposed from 10:00 am to 7:00 pm. When visiting please keep in your intentions a prayer for vocations to religious life. Friday, 4:00 pm to 5:00 pm, the Guadalupe's pray and sing in Spanish. At 5:15 pm to 6:00 pm, we have Children's Eucharistic Adoration

Let us strengthen our faith in Jesus' real presence in the Eucharist and rediscover the source of hope that we all desire. Eucharistic Adoration is held every First Friday in the Church.

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick helps unite those who are suffering with Jesus' saving and healing power. Through this sacrament people receive forgiveness for their sins and comfort in their suffering; they are restored in spirit; and sometimes they even experience the return of physical health. Suffering is a part of life, but Jesus unites our suffering with his passion and death so that through our suffering we can participate in his saving and healing work. The sacrament also reminds us that God wants to give comfort to the suffering and wants us to relieve suffering where we can.

Children's Eucharistic Adoration

Children's Eucharistic Adoration happens the First Friday of each month. **We get together at 5:15 pm to 6:00 pm** for contemplation, scripture, worship, praise and song. We worship our Lord by singing and praying in ways that gently introduce our youth to this special devotion.

DID YOU KNOW?

To establish confidence with your children start with questions about their daily activities.

Sometimes children will behave in a manner quite unusual for them – stress, misunderstanding, or some form of abuse can be related to such behaviors. If you see your child exhibiting unusual behavior, talk with your child about their day or recent experiences in an open-ended conversation. Do ask factual questions, such as, “What did you do today? Did you do anything unusual today? Who did you see today? Did anyone say or do anything that was unusual or even upsetting? Then, ask feeling questions as a follow-up, and remember that sometimes it’s easier for a child to talk about someone else’s feelings first. 
