A Life Issue: Poverty in America and the World

When the Church speaks of the Respect of Life, we are talking about a whole host of issues. Abortion usually comes to mind immediately. But there are other issues as well. One not spoken about often, or well understood is the right to engage in work; in work that gives the person dignity.

As Labor Day is almost upon us, I wanted to review the social teaching of the Church on work. The United States Catholic Conference of Bishops say, "The economy must serve people, not the other way around. Work is more than a way to make a living; it is a form of continuing participation in God's creation. If the dignity of work is to be protected, then the basic rights of workers must be respected--the right to productive work, to decent and fair wages, to the organization and joining of unions, to private property, and to economic initiative."

Jesus worked as a carpenter most of his life. We assume it was no accident that Jesus was born to an average family, not rich nor royal. We understand work as something intrinsically good. We are co-creators of God's world and work is part of our contribution.

Saint John Paul II, Pope Benedict and Pope Francis have all spoken on the right to organize in a trade union. While trade union membership has declined over the years, the pressure on worker's job security, pay and conditions has continued to grow. Flexible work practices have come in with the globalized market. Pay has been squeezed. Many men and women who lost their jobs during the economic downturn never returned to the kind of work they were doing before, and never recovered their previous rate of pay, even if they have found work since.

Instead, workers have ended up working longer hours for less pay, with families often paying the price. The weakening of trade union collective power has been a significant part of this process. The campaign for the \$15 minimum wage has been a response to this.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church states that: "business owners and management must not limit themselves to taking into account only the economic objectives of the company, the criteria for economic efficiency and the proper care of "capital" as the sum of the means of production. It is also their precise duty to respect concretely the human dignity of those who work in the company." Pope John Paul II's encyclical *Centesimus Annus* – "The One Hundredth Year" (1991), states that these workers constitute "the firm's most valuable asset."

Part of honoring work, is to honor the whole person, including the chance to balance work, family and faith. Not working on the Sabbath used to be normative. Today it is not. Let each of us think about our relationship to the work we perform. Do we as workers give our best performance at work? Do those of us who have employees treat them fairly and with respect? This Labor Day, maybe we can spend some time in reflection about work as well as enjoying a well-deserved rest!

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The wonderful diversity of life and worship among Roman Catholics of East and West is an example of God writing straight with crooked lines. The steady hand of the villainous Emperor Diocletian drew a line across Europe and Africa that split the empire in two, and for the most part determined how Christians would worship two thousand years later.

Italy's heel and the far northern city of Trieste fell on the Eastern side, and have had a form of Eastern liturgy ever since. Constantinople, which soon became the seat of the Roman Empire, became a base for Christianizing the East up to Russia and Poland. Poland was on the Eastern side, but a series of wars and medieval mayhem pushed the religious boundary back to the Ukraine, and Poland remains an outpost of the Latin Church to this day.

An old rule of thumb declared that whatever religion was observed by the local prince, the people had to follow. This gave rise to persecution and migration as people sought toleration for their expressions of faith. In the United States, we are accustomed to peaceful collaboration among Christians of East and West, a situation that challenges churches that still feel the pinch of age-old division.

WELCOME THE STRANGER

We have become accustomed to seeing pictures in the media and stories on the news about immigrants from Latin America and refugees from Syria fleeing violence and destruction in their own countries, trying to make their way to a safe place. We have also seen the reactions of people who want to keep them away from their countries, who fail to welcome the stranger and the helpless children. Have we forgotten Jesus' call to comfort the homeless and the stranger? "They shall bring all your brothers and sisters from all the nations . . . to Jerusalem, my holy mountain, says the Lord."

In the three readings for this day, we are told that we are to welcome these strangers, to welcome the discipline of the Lord, which leads to peace, and to "strive to enter through the narrow gate" into the glory of God's own homeland, the reign of God.

AC RENOVATION PROJECT UPDATE

As you might have noticed, there is a new trailer outside of the hall. This trailer is the next step in the replacement of the air conditioning and the roof in the church and Msgr. Pierce Hall. The trailer will serve as a temporary sacristy as work is done to make modifications and improvements to the church sacristy.

This coming week, we will start moving items out of the sacristy and into the trailer. The church sacristy will not be accessible beginning Monday, August 26th. For the next 6 to 8 weeks, the trailer is expected to serve as the sacristy for clergy and the various lay ministers such as altar servers, lectors and Eucharistic ministers, and storage of all of the vestments and supplies used in the various liturgical celebrations.

We anticipate that temporary air-conditioning will be installed for the church while this work is being done. This will enable us to continue celebrating all services in the church without interruption throughout the course of construction. The air-conditioning equipment is expected to



be placed at the northwest corner of the church, so access through that entrance will not be possible. The renovation will start in earnest after Labor Day. This will include roofing demolition and the air conditioner removal.

The church roof and air-conditioning will be the initial and primary focus. Once that is completed, the same improvements will be made in the parish hall. All work is expected to be completed by late Fall.

We appreciate everyone's patience and support. Please pray for a successful project.






MASS IN RECOGNITION OF ALL IMMIGRANTS



DID YOU KNOW?

Keep an eye out during social events at school and church

Now that your children are getting ready to head back to school, it's a good time to re-familiarize yourself with the school or church property. Keep a special lookout for any rooms or areas where supervision is low, and where a predator could take a child without being noticed.

During school events, these are the places to watch. You should also take note of any locked doors, areas under bleachers or in stairwells, or anywhere else suspicious. 
