

Economic Justice for All

In 1996 the US Catholic Bishops published, *Economic Justice for All: Pastoral Letter on Catholic Social Teaching and the U.S. Economy*. It opens with:

“We are believers called to follow our Lord Jesus Christ and proclaim his Gospel in the midst of a complex and powerful economy. This reality poses both opportunities and responsibilities for Catholics in the United States. Our faith calls us to measure this economy not only by what it produces, but also by how it touches human life and whether it protects or undermines the dignity of the human person. Economic decisions have human consequences and moral content; they help or hurt people, strengthen, or weaken family life, advance or diminish the quality of justice in our land.”

The Covid 19 pandemic has exposed cracks in our economy that has left some Americans behind. This should be disturbing to all Catholics. Everyone in the United States has suffered during this time of staying safe at home, closed schools, closed Churches, wearing masks when we leave our houses, and the disruption to our daily lives. However, some segments of our economy have been able to work from home. Most of these have been better paying, so-called white-collar jobs. Others, considered essential workers, have continued to work – though at greater risk to themselves and their families. Americans who worked for minimum or close to minimum wages did not have any cushion to fall back on when their jobs disappeared. Small business owners and their employees are taking the brunt of the hit to their economic security. The nature of small businesses, particularly individually or family owned, are riskier enterprises with minimal investment to rely upon. The working poor of America are frequently one paycheck away from losing their homes, usually rented. They have less access to decent health care. Often over the threshold for Medi-Cal, but unable to afford insurance premiums, they have used emergency rooms as their primary health care. It is these Americans who have been financially devastated.

The one-time payment of \$1200 from the Federal government was a step in the right direction, but that money did not go far and has long been exhausted. The food pantries and schools' food giveaways are also a step in the right direction, plus the new P-EBT program will help school families and Medi-Cal recipients. But not everyone has Medi-Cal and they are in danger of going hungry.



It is hard to know what to do. The problem of inequality has existed all along, but it was hidden to most of us. It is not hidden anymore, and we have a responsibility to work on a solution. The pastoral letter details what is required for economic justice, so those should be the actions with which we should concern ourselves. They are as follows. 1. Every economic decision and institution must be judged in light of whether it protects or undermines the dignity of the human person. 2. Human dignity can be realized and protected only in community. 3. All people have a right to participate in the economic life of society. 4. All members of society have a special obligation to the poor and vulnerable. 5. Human rights are the minimum conditions for life in community. 6. Society as a whole, acting through public and private institutions, has the moral responsibility to enhance human dignity and protect human rights.

Today, we celebrate Pentecost. We have received the advocate promised us by Jesus. The gifts of the Holy Spirit are ours to strive for: Wisdom, Understanding, Counsel, Fortitude and Knowledge will be needed to correct these inequalities that have been exposed. Let us call upon the Holy Spirit for courage and strength to tackle this problem.



Guidelines for Churches to reopen have been issued and Archbishop Gomez has worked closely with the Los Angeles County Supervisors, the City of Los Angeles and the Public Health Department to determine when he will be able to set a date to safely reopen Catholic churches.

It is possible that we might first open the Church for private devotions limited to small numbers of people. Confessions may be outside – perhaps on the Msgr. Pierce Hall patio. At this point we know that attendance for each Mass will be limited to 100 people in the church building. We are exploring the possibility of streaming to the parish hall, or hosting additional Masses in the parish hall, or even the possibility of people staying in their vehicles for Mass.

Prior to opening, each parish will be required to submit a plan to the Regional Bishop's Office for approval, using the guidelines provided by the Archdiocese and Health Department. We are currently continuing to work on our plan to be able to reopen our Church. If all goes well, it is possible we will reopen within the next week or two. Any reopening will likely be staged, with devotions first, then weekday Masses, and finally Sunday Masses.

New safety practices and different considerations to accommodate Mass, while keeping everyone safe, will be our top priority. Some practices will be the same ones you are familiar with, for example, wearing a mask or practicing social distancing. There will also be some specific worship related guidelines for items like receiving Holy Communion or how to clean the church after each use. We will need everyone's cooperation.

Even when the church is opened for liturgies or devotions, the Archbishop has indicated that he will extend the dispensation from attending Sunday Mass for a period of time. That will enable those who are uncomfortable with returning or who have good reason to not attend Mass in person, particularly the elderly or those with suppressed immune systems, to be comfortable that they are still in God's good grace.

We anticipate needing volunteers to assist us when we can reopen. If you think you can help us with some of the tasks we anticipate, such as cleaning the church or giving directions to parishioners and guests, please contact the Parish Center. We are starting to create a list of volunteers and will reach out to you when more details are available.

Finally, please continue to check the parish website frequently for ongoing information and updates. The parish website is www.stlouisedm.org.

Please continue to pray for the successful reopening of our church and for all of those impacted by the pandemic.

SAINT CHARLES LWANGA AND HIS COMPANIONS (MARTYED 1886-87)

June 3

“Master of Pages,” reputedly the handsomest man in all Uganda, Charles Lwanga, lay catechist, courageously led about forty teenaged boys, Catholics and Anglicans, on a forty-mile forced march to martyrdom for their common Christian faith. Teaching each other the hymns of their different churches, they strengthened one another for the ordeal ahead. King Mwanga, himself barely twenty, had ordered them executed for being “those who pray.” But these royal pages were the king’s male harem, who, now Christians, refused what pious accounts demurely describe as his “unreasonable demands.” Some were clubbed to death, most burned alive; the youngest, thirteen-year old Saint Kizito, whom Charles had often shielded from the King’s lust; the most tragic, Saint Mbagwa, whose father was his executioner! In 1964, Paul VI canonized the young Catholics and praised their Anglican companions, recalling the heroism of early Christianity’s African martyrs, which we modern Christians of far less faith never expected to see repeated. Forty years after the Pope’s words, what does our faith cost us? Heroism aside, how generous is our response?

THE RICHNESS OF THE SPIRIT

Students, and most adults recalling their school days, are familiar with the phrase “compare and contrast” that shows up from time to time on tests. Today we hear two different accounts of the giving of the Holy Spirit to the church. Let’s contrast, then compare. Luke’s account from Acts is filled with arresting details: the mighty wind from heaven, the tongues of flame, the miracle of different languages. John’s account seems timid: fearful disciples, the wounded Christ, the expelling of breath from his risen body, not from the sky. Our literal, modern minds wonder which way it happened; our noisy culture probably makes us prefer the former. But if we compare the two, we find that the dazzling richness of the Spirit fills both accounts, for it is the very breath of the risen Christ, ascended to the sky in Luke, that appears to his disciples in John and sends his followers forth to carry on his mission of forgiving sin and proclaiming the mighty acts of God.

SOCIAL TEACHING: GLOBAL SOLIDARITY

Catholic social teaching consists of a wide range of principles, from the dignity of the human person, to economic justice, environmental stewardship, and the rights and responsibilities of each person. The final principle looks at social justice from the most macro level: Global Solidarity and Development.

The principle teaches that the common good we work toward must transcend national and global boundaries. We must ultimately see ourselves connected to every human being, and working with them for the good of all. This is, admittedly, a lofty goal that's hard to achieve. But, as the Church taught in the Sacred Constitution on the Church in the Modern World, at the Second Vatican Council:

“All must consider it their sacred duty to count social obligations among their chief duties today and observe them as such. For the more closely the world comes together, the more widely do people's obligations transcend particular groups and extend to the whole world. This will be realized only if individuals and groups practice moral and social virtues and foster them in social living. Then, under the necessary help of divine grace, there will arise a generation of new women and men, the molders of a new humanity.” (GeS #30)


A lofty goal indeed. But remember, the purpose of all the principles of Catholic social teaching is not to describe the world as it is, but to guide us toward the world as we wish it to be. Short of the Kingdom of God, these principles may seem idealistic. But it remains a crucial part of the Church's mission to encourage us all to work toward a more just, more peaceful world.

MEMORIAL OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY, MOTHER OF THE CHURCH


June 1

On February 11, 2018, the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments inscribed a new obligatory Memorial of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of the Church, into the General Roman Calendar. This memorial is celebrated every year on the Monday after Pentecost. Latin liturgical texts were also promulgated the same day.
