

Climate Change And Caring For Our Common Home

I have written before on ecology and care for God's creation. Pope Francis made it perfectly clear that we have a responsibility to protect earth, as it is "our common home." His encyclical "Laudato Si, Care for our Common Home" was published in June of 2015. The situation today is even more dire than it was in 2015. Pope Francis opened his encyclical with "Praise be to you, my Lord." These words, quoting St. Francis of Assisi's beautiful canticle, remind us that our common home is like a sister with whom we share our life and a beautiful mother who opens her arms to embrace us. The encyclical is broken into themes that outline the challenges we need to overcome to care for the earth. Some of the themes of the encyclical are as follows:

- A Moral and Spiritual Challenge.
- Care for God's Creation.
- We are All Connected.
- Impact on the Poor.
- Called to Solidarity.
- Technological and economic development must serve human beings and enhance human dignity.

California and Los Angeles County in particular are feeling the impact of climate change. Water is disappearing! We see pictures of our reservoirs with shrinking water levels and lakes with cracked and dried mud on the land surrounding them. The Colorado river is in danger, and that is a major supplier of water for the Southwest, both Municipal and farmland. As temperatures rise, wildfires explode, and our air quality is in decline, the problem may seem overwhelming. While we must take this crisis seriously, we shouldn't panic. There are things we can do to help.

We need to plant trees. Trees provide shade that reduce the temperature of the areas around them. Rising temperature is one of the problems we need to solve. There are watering restrictions in place, now, but keeping trees watered is an exemption. We are asked to hand water them with our hose, not use our sprinklers. By the way, if you have a backyard vegetable garden, that too is exempted.



We need to replace lawns with plants that are native to our climate. Check out the City of Covina's Water Conservation - Rebate & Incentive Programs. Residents and businesses are eligible for rebates on water conserving fixtures, landscaping equipment, flow monitors, and turf replacement. Visit www.bewaterwise.com to view available rebate programs. If you live in a neighboring town or live in the county, search the internet with "turf conversion programs near me."

We need to look at the appliances in our homes. Make sure they are in good running condition. That will save energy, especially heating and cooling systems. In our neighborhoods, we need to lobby for more green spaces. No city lot should remain empty. Ask our cities to develop them into small green spaces.

These are some ways we can make a difference and care for our Sister/Mother Earth.



Synthesis of our Listening Sessions

Synod 21-23
For a synodal Church

Speaking & Listening

- People would like more opportunities for group discussion and feel like the Synod is one good way. One way is to have Parish Council meetings opened with members of every group and ministry participating.
- Faith Formation is important in order to inform people on the Eucharist, Catholic teaching on divorce, same sex attraction, and the faith. These topics should also be taught from the pulpit. Also Priests should conduct Bible Studies, not lay people.
- People are reluctant to speak up about their faith and have been mocked. People are troubled that family members are not attending Mass and practicing their faith.
- The Church should do more evangelizing. We need to accept all people.

Celebrating

- It is important to have a reverent Mass that includes good homily that provides practical advice for our lives, good holy music, and reverence during the Mass and Eucharist. People missed the Mass and Eucharist during the Covid closures of churches.
- It is important to develop a sense of community by social activities (women’s, men’s and youth groups). We need to evangelize the youth. Develop a “real” youth group; not one that is mandated as part of the confirmation program.
- We need transparency and communication on how money was spent from previous fundraising campaigns. It is important to keep parishioners informed about where the money is going from the various fundraising appeals (for example, Living our Faith and Moving Forward in Faith).
- Restore the traditional order of the sacraments; have confirmation at a younger age to receive the graces earlier.

Dialoguing

- It is challenging to do the missionary work of the church and one reason is lack of knowledge about all the programs, services, and ministries the church offers. The church should train people to be missionaries in their own communities and to do this, more catechesis is needed. The church should talk more about the impact and influence the church has in our local community and world.
- Parishioners need guidance on how to navigate the secular world. Many Catholics are reluctant to share their faith openly. We should encourage people to share their faith more often.
- Parishioners should be made aware that they can schedule time to talk to a priest or deacon for counseling in their faith.

Leading & Deciding

- The Holy Spirit guided us during the pandemic. When churches were closed, we had outdoor Mass, which allowed for the reception of the Eucharist. Fr. Robert’s regular phone calls during the pandemic were appreciated. There was a weak response from the top Church leadership during the pandemic regarding keeping churches open.
- The Holy Spirit guides us in community in various ways: We had a community prayer service for peace in Ukraine. We donated to various charities as one community (for example Together in Mission). An adoration chapel would be great to have.
- Fellowship can be an avenue for evangelization (for example donuts and coffee after Mass). We can use modern methods for evangelization like social media.
 - Church leaders need to clearly speak the truth. They should be brave and bold.

Growing in Synodality

- People appreciated the opportunity the Synod gave them to share their thoughts and to hear other thoughts. People have questions and concerns about the Synod process and how the information might be used. There is concern that the feedback could be used to justify deviating from established Church teaching. Change resulting from the Synod can be good. It can improve the way of doing things.
- The results from the LA diocese and St Louise Parish results should be shared.
- It is important to create an outreach atmosphere to bring people together (for example, family events, greeters at Mass, and donut Sunday).
- The Holy Spirit is inviting us to journey together through parish ministries such as RCIA, adult formation, and youth groups.
- The parish should also respond quickly to create community events based on world and local happenings (for example, a community event to live-stream the Pope’s Russia and Ukraine consecration).
- It is important for the priests and deacons to provide catechesis from the pulpit.

- A big opportunity to be missionary people is with our own parishioners. The parish can better inform us about what it is doing in the local community, country, and world. Parishes should keep parishioners informed about what is happening in the Universal Catholic Church. The church should constantly talk about vocations to religious life and about everyone’s vocation in life.
- Communicate minutes and outcomes from Parish Council meetings. The church should encourage more participation in religious conferences and retreats.
- The church should develop programs to work with families in an engaging, educational, theological, and prayerful way.

RIGHT RELATIONSHIPS

How do we bring balance and joy to our lives of prayer and service to our loving God?

In the Gospel today, Jesus tells Martha that her concern about doing the right thing as dictated by Jewish tradition might not be the best use of her energies. Her sister, Mary, who sits in rapt attention at Jesus' feet, should not be rebuked. Is Jesus trying to show Martha that she needs to make time for her spiritual nourishment?

Abraham and Sarah in the first reading seem to be just like Martha. And yet Abraham's eager welcome and joyful serving of his "visitors" seems almost spiritual. How like Paul, in the second reading, rejoicing in his service to the gospel!

We hear in the psalm that those who do justice will live in the Lord's presence. Prayer and service—what greater joy could there be?

16TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

ATTENTIVE TO GOD'S PRESENCE

Summer is in full swing and tent camping is often a memory-making part of it—sometimes just because of the difficulties of putting up the tent! In today's first reading we see Abraham sitting at the entrance to his tent and welcoming three unexpected strangers. By the end of the story God's covenant with Abraham is renewed with the promise that Sarah will give birth to a son. Psalm 15 answers the question, "Lord, who may abide in your tent?" The answer leaves little doubt about what is required to live in the presence of the Lord. In his letter to the Colossians Paul confirms that "the mystery" that was hidden from past ages is now being revealed. The Gospel account of Martha and Mary's ways of welcoming Jesus again emphasizes the central truth that God's promise of salvation is real and present—if only we would listen.

CHOOSING THE BETTER PART?

Is it possible to listen to the Gospel story about Mary and Martha without immediately "hearing between the lines" as Martha mutters to herself, "Why do I have to do all the work around here?" Or without always feeling the sting of Jesus' gentle reprimand of Martha? Without slotting our friends into either the "Martha" or "Mary" column? Without quickly "translating" the story into a lesson about the value of listening over action? Interestingly, Mary never says a word in this story. All of the dialogue is between Jesus and Martha. The importance of first listening to Jesus is, without a doubt, essential to discipleship. We need to be deeply rooted in the Word of God if we want to spread the Good News and stand firm in time of trial or temptation. Yet what does that mean when guests need to be fed?

WHEN WORK BECOMES OUR PRAYER

We know that hospitality to strangers was a central value in the cultural world of Jesus. Abraham's welcome of the three strangers at his tent was expected protocol for the time. Sarah's meal-making for the unexpected guests is blessed with welcome news of a son—and the keeping of God's promise to Abraham. Immediately before the Mary and Martha story in the Gospel of Luke is the story of the Good Samaritan. That parable is unwavering about the importance of action—of going out of our way for others. In the Abraham and the Good Samaritan stories, action predominates. Yet in the next chapter of Luke when a woman in the crowd shouts out, "Blessed is the womb that carried you . . ." Jesus responds, "Rather, blessed are those who hear the word of God and observe it." Hymnwriter Herman Stuempfle expresses well the relationship between action and contemplation when he writes that we thank the Lord both for quiet time and for the Word that accompanies us in our work and helps make that work a prayer.

DID YOU KNOW?

Healthy vs. unhealthy relationships

Knowing the difference between healthy and unhealthy relationships can help prevent human trafficking. Healthy relationships are based on respect, honesty, and trust. In these relationships, partners communicate and help hold healthy, safe boundaries. In unhealthy relationships, one partner holds power, forcing another to sacrifice friendships, family, and even emotional well-being. These relationships are often abusive. Talk with young adults and teenagers about these differences, how to build healthy relationships, and recognize the signs of unhealthy ones.
